

Once again, there was a good turnout for the Association's Annual Dinner Meeting. Approximately 60 people attended at one of our favourite venues, Massey College, on May 1st to enjoy good fare and good company. An added treat was a tour of the College's collection of 19th century hand-printing presses, conducted by Marie Korey and Richard Landon.

The University of Toronto's Edward Shorter, Hannah Professor in the History of Medicine, gave a stimulating, if somewhat controversial address. His topic, *The Disease of the Month Syndrome: A Historian's Perspective*, dealt with what he termed media-driven and even physician-driven subcultures of illness. With slides to illustrate his presentation, he spoke of diseases of previous centuries, e.g., the vapors, hysterical paralysis, brucellosis, and brought things up to date with the new diseases of the last two decades, including multiple chemical sensitivity (20th century disease) and "the winner of the disease of fashion sweepstakes", CFS (chronic fatigue syndrome). Much of Professor Shorter's material was drawn from the popular and tabloid press, and his presentation was peppered with inflammatory phrases such as "medically ordained suffering" and "medical suggestion contaminating culture". Certainly there is disagreement evident in the medical literature; despite this, provincial governments are contributing millions to establish an environmental health clinic at Dalhousie, and a research and clinical program in environmental illness at the U of T. (CMAJ 1995 Apr. 15; 152(8): 1292-1294).

The evening ended on a delicious note, with a dessert buffet and coffee. For this, for the refreshments during the cocktail hour and for a special door prize, we are grateful to our generous sponsors: BOVAR-CONCORD Environmental, CANEBSCO, FAXON Canada, Infomart-DIALOG Limited, Lehmann Bookbinding, Login Brothers, and Wallaceburg Bookbinders.

As a postscript to the evening, we would like to mention that Professor Shorter donated his honorarium to the Museum of Mental Health Services. Located at 1001 Queen Street West in Toronto, the Museum is a registered charity dedicated to recovering the early history of mental health services in Canada. The Museum funds projects of the Archives on the History of Canadian Psychiatry and Mental Health Services, and is developing a public display and interpretation centre.

MARCH MEETING REPORT

Rail strike and Oscar Night notwithstanding, an audience of 24 gathered on March 27th to hear about the new health legislation effective April 3, 1995. The site was the sparkling new facility of the CMCC's C.C. Clemmer Health Science Library. Marilyn Schafer and staff generously provided library tours and delicious refreshments.

We were privileged to have as speaker Gilbert Sharpe, Director of the Legal Services Branch of the Ontario Ministry of Health. An accomplished speaker, Mr. Sharpe set the tone of the session as, in a relaxed and informal manner, he spoke of the history behind the legislation. More than 20 years in the making, it grew out of concerns regarding confidentiality of health care information and non-consensual treatment. It aims to codify principles of consent to health care, and is intended to create guiding principles, or balanced rules, for society. This is a movement which "transcends governments".

A colleague of Mr. Sharpe's, Halyna Perun, Counsel at the Legal Services Branch, continued the session by describing highlights of the Substitute Decisions Act, the Advocacy Act, and the Consent to Treatment Act. The first act continues Powers of Attorney for property, creates Powers of Attorney for personal care and establishes the office of Public Guardian and Trustee. The second act sets up an Advocacy Commission, including "rights advisors", to protect "vulnerable" persons. According to the third act, health professionals have the responsibility to ensure that patients give informed consent; the concept of "capacity" is integral to this act. Ms. Perun responded to several questions and it was apparent that the audience was interested from both professional and personal viewpoints. The evening concluded with the presentation of a small gift to longtime THLA member (and soon to be New York state resident), Mary Boite, in celebration of her pending nuptials. Thanks to Elaine Wright for arranging such an enjoyable evening!

95th ANNUAL MEETING OF MLA IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

From May 7-12 Washington, DC played host to 2,500 delegates to the 95th Annual Medical Library Association meeting and the 7th International Congress on Medical Librarianship. Approximately 30 countries were represented, including Canada whose embassy provided the site for the Farewell Reception.

The combined theme for the two events, "Health Information for the Global Village", proved to be more cohesive than one might have thought possible. Despite the dazzling spectrum of cultural, political, economic and social perspectives represented at the meetings, a large number of health information issues were common to all. The problems arising from financial constraints, restructuring, and changes in technology are being experienced, albeit in varying degrees, in libraries around the globe. The inaccessibility of the Internet's vast resources, for example, is in some practical ways as keenly felt by North American librarians isolated in institutions without nodes, as by librarians in the developing world. Nonetheless, the creativity and dedication with which information providers in the so-called "have-not" countries pursue their objectives is sobering for all of us in the West who believe that we are suffering professionally.

It was an honour for me personally to be the incoming Chair of MLA's International Co-Operation Section at this particular meeting. My contacts with the international community, both from within a small special library, and now from my own (even smaller!) company have been richly rewarding. The ICS promotes awareness of international issues, fosters communication and understanding among members through projects, job exchanges and a quarterly newsletter, and manages the Cunningham Memorial International Fellowship. Each year the Cunningham provides some funding for a health librarian from outside North America to visit for 6 months to libraries in the U.S. and Canada, and also provides assistance to four foreign delegates to the MLA meeting.

I strongly encourage THLA members who are also members of MLA to join the ICS for a bargain \$10 US per annum! DOCLINE UPDATE

A DOCLINE Steering Committee has been set up under the auspices of the Consortium, with participation from THLA and UTL. The Steering Committee is chaired by Joan Leishman, Executive Director of the Consortium, and the members include: Marilyn Schafer representing THLA, Elizabeth Reid representing the joint THLA/Consortium Union List of Periodicals Committee, Sandra Langlands representing UTL, John Jackson representing the Consortium Interlibrary Loan Subcommittee, and Linda McFarlane representing the Consortium Management Committee.

The DOCLINE Steering Committee will explore in detail the implications of participation in DOCLINE (especially in connection with using the union list to report holdings), recommend a decision regarding participation by the end of June 1995, and coordinate the work that needs to be done if the decision is made to go ahead with DOCLINE.

If the decision is made to go ahead, it will take at least a year to complete the changes to the union list required for reporting holdings to NLM for DOCLINE.

DOCLINE will be a topic of discussion at the CHLA/ABSC National Conference in St. John's, Newfoundland, June 2-7. The CHLA Task Force on Resource Sharing has a mandate to facilitate the implementation of DOCLINE across Canada.
