CHLA/ABSC HOSPITAL LIBRARIAN OF THE YEAR

Carol Morrison, Director of Library Services at the Ontario Cancer Institute (OCI) since 1979, is a worthy recipient of this award. In the past year, she engineered a smooth, successful move to a new building in the heart of Toronto. The OCI Library, which serves as an oncology resource well beyond the Toronto community, received a 98% approval rating from active medical and surgical staff in a 1992 Employee Viewpoint Survey and comments such as "exemplary, world class" from a 1993 Accreditation Surveyors' organizational debriefing.

Carol has contributed greatly to the broader professional community. She has been involved with the Health Science Information Consortium of Toronto since its inception, serving as Chair of the Working Group to investigate Health Library Consortia (1987), member of the Interim Management Committee (1989-1990), Chair of the Search Committee/IMC (1990), Chair of the Nominating Committee (1990), Chair of the Management Committee (1992-1994), Chair of the Oncology Group for Collection Rationalization (1992-present), Secretary of the Core Collection Rationalization group (1992-present), Director (1994-1996), Chair of the Task Force to Review Fee Structure (1994) and finally, Chair of the Task Force to Review the Role & Membership Model (1996-present). Carol has served as member on several University of Toronto educational Task Forces and the university's Library Advisory Council and acted as Vice-President and President (1981-1983) of the Toronto Health Libraries Association. In December 1994 THLA presented Carol, longtime host of THLA's festive season celebrations, with an honorary life membership.

She has been active in even wider circles, working with the Ontario Hospital Libraries Association (OHLA) and CHLA/ABSC, serving as Secretary of the latter in 1984-1985, Director (1983-1985), Coordinator of the Membership Survey/Needs Assessment project (1985-1986) and Chair of the Facilities Committee for the 1984 Annual Conference. In addition to serving as UNYOC Membership Chair for Canada (1985-1987), she was Chair of the Programme Committee for the 1983 conference and Chair of Facilities for the conferences in 1988 and 1993.

Somehow Carol has found time to share some of her expertise through publications, seminars and workshops. She has collaborated with physicians from OCI to publish papers in medical journals and has prepared cumulative indexes for such distinguished publications as the *Annals of Thoracic Surgery*, *Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology*, *Chest*, etc. and has received high praise from physicians and publishers alike for her fine work.

Many Toronto librarians have been fortunate to have Carol as tutor and mentor; a former student hails her as "the consummate librarian". Fellow librarians regard her in high esteem. THLA received numerous endorsements of its nomination for this award from members. These included comments that Carol was a pioneer (and current expert) in online searching, is an outstanding "cancer librarian", a great team player, and a public-service oriented, dedicated person who doesn't hesitate to take on leadership roles. In addition to all this, she is "a joy to work with".

THE CADUSEUS



Clifford C. Snyder, M.D. Professor, Dept. of Surgery, University of Utah School of Medicine

Most of the laity recognize the caduceus of Hermes (ka-doo-se-us) as the emblem of medicine. The word in Greek originates from karykeion, and that from karyx meaning a herald's badge or staff. The word caduceum is practically of the same meaning in Latin. The caduceus was worn or displayed by Roman surgeons, as well by official Roman messengers.

The Greek herald is Hermes (Roman-Mercury), who announced or heralded for the gods. He wore winged shoes and a titivating petasus (hat). This "divine" messenger carried with legendary passion a double-winged-wand around which were coiled two snakes facing one another in the pose of male and female copulating, expressing unity, fertility, and peace. The popular Greek legend is that Hermes came upon two snakes at war and with adorable deliberation he beguiled them to cease

warring and into loving one another. He did this by throwing a staff, which Aesculapius gave him, between the two snakes and they immediately became entwined with it.

The early physicians should have been reluctant to adopt Hermes and his magic wand as their emblem since he was depicted as a clever crook and was god of thieves and rogues. However, Hermes was not all bad. In the third century he became interested in theology and philosophy, along with his previous commitments as god of athletes and guardian of health. Hermes became associated with the confused fields of chemistry, pharmacy and medicine in the sixteenth century. Because of these affiliations, his caduceus staff became involved with the medical field.

The caduceus was selected as the emblem of the U.S. Marine Hospital Service in 1856, the Public Health Service in 1871, the U.S. Army medical corps in 1902, and later by the Dental Corps, Veterinary Corps, Army Nursing Corps and the Sanitary Corps. The American Medical Association employed it officially in 1912. Hermes was not a physician!

CHLA/ABSC CONFERENCE: *Drawing Closer - Reaching Further*

Beautiful B.C. - Lotus Land - God's Country! The 1997 CHLA Annual Conference was held on the campus of the University of British Columbia in Vancouver, and this reporter (a graduate of UBC's School of Library, Archival and Information Science) looked forward eagerly to a return to that site after an absence of 11 years. My report is succinct: It rained. A lot.

But enough about the weather... The majesty of snow-covered mountains (when you could see them) and sea prevailed. The company was great, of course, and our chapter was well-represented. The social events went very well. The opening reception was in the lovely Cecil Green House with its gorgeous ocean view, and the banquet, a casual barbecue held in the justly famous Museum of Anthropology, impressed everyone with its melt-in-the-mouth salmon and fascinating native art.

Unfortunately I did not attend any of the CE programs, but I heard positive reviews, including glowing reports on **Jan Greenwood's** "Reinventing Yourself in the Workplace", delivered valiantly by a flu-stricken Jan. I wish I'd been able to attend **Rita Vine's** "Discover and Integrate Internet Information into Your Medical Library Practice".

The first keynote address was given by a very interesting man, Dr. Robert G. Evans, a health economist and researcher at UBC. Dr. Evans was a member of the recent National Forum on Health and spoke intelligently (at times humourously) on the core issues of the health care system. He emphasized the interaction between health spending and the general economy. He stated that progress, rather than regress, will depend on

improving the information base which may be used in decision-making and spoke of four types of databases: managerial, clinical, health status and wider determinants of health. The challenge is to filter and link huge amounts of scattered information from different disciplines.

The second keynote speaker, Dr. Anne Crichton of UBC, presented an historical review of our nation's community participation in the development of health service policy making as we moved from a rural to an industrial society and described the types of power which fuel the system.

There were interesting speakers from Britain as well as from across Canada who presented papers (to be reported in BMC, no doubt). There was a panel discussion of librarians who have faced the challenge of restructuring and lived to tell their tales, of great interest to members of the Toronto group who are about to witness something similar.

A highlight of the Conference was the presentation by Susan Murray of two CHLA/ABSC awards: Hospital Librarian of the Year to **Carol Morrison** of OCI (details elsewhere in this issue) and Outstanding Achievement to **Jim Henderson** of the B.C. Medical Library Service (a.k.a. Mr. Doeline). It was an interesting concept to hold the conference on a university campus, and the Vancouver conference team is to be congratulated on their arrangements and their hospitality. If anyone wants the recipe for the famous UBC cinnamon bun, let me know, because I dashed over (in the rain) to the campus bookstore and bought *Treats from the UBC Bakeshop* (bibliographic details available on request).
