THLA PRESIDENT-ELECT

Constitution: The President Elect shall act in the absence of the President, assist the President in the performance of duties, act as Program Coordinator, and perform other duties as assigned by the Executive.


THLA/CONSORTIUM UNION LIST UPDATE

No revised edition of the Union List has been published since the 12th edition in May, 1996. The committee responsible for the List is well aware of the inconvenience this has caused. They have decided to take advantage of a new service offered by CISTI, whereby CISTI can generate a union list for the Consortium from records in SERHOLD at a very reasonable price.

CISTI will do the inputting for all participating libraries on a regular basis, at a cost of between 20 and 35¢ per record. For the first year, at least, the cost of updating holdings will be borne by the Consortium, since the Consortium Assistant has traditionally done this work in-house. The Union List Committee has recommended that updates be coordinated through the Consortium Office.

One drawback of going the CISTI route is that the deadline for holdings updates has been missed in order to receive a union list this year. In order to tide everyone over until an updated list from SERHOLD can be generated, the committee has proposed the creation of a supplement, containing three lists: titles that libraries have cancelled since the last edition; title changes; and titles for which new subscriptions have been started since the last edition.

WEB HEALTH WATCH

MedWeb: Biomedical Resources (www.emory.edu/WHSCL/medweb.html) is a collection of medical links compiled by the Emory University Health Science Library. It serves as an all-purpose information resource for health science professionals: Homepages for various hospitals world-wide; web-accessible information on various pathologies; treatment centres; career opportunities; conferences, etc. One of its most useful features is that a large number of these categories are grouped geographically. However, its 'default' options are not well explained and are somewhat hard to understand. In addition, the graphics sometimes make reading the text a bit difficult. This site is in the process of major renovation and we look forward to a more streamlined product in the near future.

Doctor's Guide to the Internet (www.docguide.com)
"...was designed to help physicians cost-effectively
harness the resources of the Internet and the World
Wide Web." This goal seems to have been fulfilled with
almost seamless transitions between pages which
nevertheless, let the user know exactly where they are
in the system. Directly from the homepage, a wellorganized 'site map' is available. From this index, it is
possible to choose from one of nine general categories
or from one of 25 pathologies. If none of the categories
is satisfactory for the particular search, four search
engines are provided.

Doctor's Guide to Medical Conferences and meetings (www.pslgroup.com/MEDCONF.HTM)* is directly linked to the Doctor's Guide to the Internet homepage. From this site it is possible: to view conferences by subject or by date/location; to search the conference database; and even add to the event database. Like all other direct links from the Doctor's Guide to the Internet Homepage, information is easily accessible and in-between-steps are almost transparent.

GENERAL MEETING REPORT

Monday, February 9, 1998

THLA members were on hand to listen to **Dr. Arnold Noyek** speak about **CISEPO** (Canada-International Scientific Exchange Program) and the Peace Initiative. Dr. Noyek is the Otolaryngologist-in-Chief at Mount Sinai Hospital, with a cross-appointment in Medical Imaging and Executive Director of CISEPO.

Dr. Noyek's background lends credence to his belief in internationalism. He is a Jew who was born in Dublin, Ireland, whose grandfather had a history with the IRA. He has had some medical training in New York, and practices in Canada, and has published extensively in peer-reviewed journals.

Dr. Noyek's spoke passionately in his belief that medical services may be effective tools for peace building in the Middle East. He described many situations in which Jewish, Jordanian, and Palestinian physicians worked together for the benefit of people in the Middle East, despite their nationality.

Canada's role in CISEPO has been to offer physicians of various nationalities an umbrella to work under. For example, Jordanian and Israeli physicians may meet, work, and collaborate without penalty or reprisal.

Continuing education is a vital element of the Peace Initiative, where Dr. Noyek and other physicians will "train the trainers," increase physician skills in the Middle East, and change the attitudes of people by demonstrating they can work together. By taking Academia out of the ivory tower and putting it to work in the field, Dr. Noyek and CISEPO are helping to build bridges between communities.

It was a pleasure to learn about Dr. Noyek, his efforts, and the important role that Canada plays in helping the Peace Initiative happen.
