CHLA/ABSC Annual Conference 1998 A Brief Report

The year's CHLA conference was something of a watershed event, at least for the people staying in the Ramada Plaza in Hull. As I heard several attendees say, the Halifax conference organizers will have their work cut out for them to match the excitement of a fire brigade and a partial evacuation of the hotel. Lois Wyndham gets high marks for taking the CHLA board notes with her as she left the hotel.

The tone of the conference was set by Alan Nymark, Associate Deputy Minister of Health, in his keynote address in which he discussed Health Canada and the Information Highway. Of particular interest to CHLA, Mr. Nymark discussed Joanne Marshall's concept paper, "A National Health Library and Information Network for Canada", and Jim Henderson's proposal for a Health Libraries Assistance Act. The panel discussion on advocacy, on the final day, tied in nicely with the opening forum. Recently, Joanne Marshall announced that she has signed a contract to work with Health Canada in enlarging her concept paper over the next 3 months. She will be receiving valuable assistance from Jim Henderson and from Lois Wyndham, who is chairing a resource group aimed at providing input to the development process of the concept paper.

Conference attendees were treated to many informative papers on topics as diverse as the internet, the programmatic library, copyright, evidence-based philosophies, consumer health, benchmarking, and new interactive software, to list but a few. In the exhibit hall, we had a chance to speak with many vendors and representatives of library-related organizations, and also to have discussions with the minds behind the several informative poster presentations. As usual, the opening reception and the banquet were popular events.

Information Centre Profile

Willow: Ontario Breast Cancer Support & Resource Services

Willow is very much part of the consumer health movement of the nineties. It is a response to the needs of women who are diagnosed with breast cancer, and who need both support and information for themselves, their families and friends in order to cope with the changes that this life-threatening disease brings.

Willow grew out of the National Forum on Breast Cancer in Montreal in 1993 which created awareness about the disease, and the dedicated work of a group of women who worked to build it. One of its unique features is its independence, unlike most Canadian consumer health information centres, which are in hospitals or libraries.

Since the spring of 1996, women at any stage of breast cancer can call or visit Willow and know that they can talk to someone who has experienced the disease. They can inform themselves about whatever aspect of breast cancer concerns them. Often that means making choices between two kinds of chemotherapy that they have been offered, or feeling anxious about having radiation or surgery, or about taking Tamoxifen, the drug which has been in the news a great deal this year.

Housed in a Victorian store-front in the Riverdale area of Toronto, Willow provides a reference collection of 300 books and monographs, and approximately 1,200 items in information files on 190 different topics about breast cancer. The collection is used by Willow's staff of seven, and by its trained volunteers, twenty-three women who are all breast cancer survivors. Anyone in the area is welcome to drop in and use the resources.

Through our Network program we also promote the development of breast cancer self-help groups - there are currently more than 60 of them in Ontario - and we support their information needs on request.

A toll-free line [1-888-778-3100] and a web-site [www.willow.org] ensure that the support through

information that Willow gives is available regardless of where people live. People come to us with complex requests, and my role often involves searching Medline, or PDQ or the growing multitude of databases on health on the Internet. We mail out information packages to anyone who needs them, carefully sourcing the information, and encouraging the recipients to discuss it with their health professionals.

The management of the resources is a one-person operation. That includes everything from reviewing publications for ordering, processing orders, cataloguing new materials, doing databases searches, reviewing information packages prepared by volunteers, scanning journals for articles for our information files, to tidying shelves and filing and of course, keeping up with new developments in the field.

Temporary contracts from time to time have allowed us to hire a technician who has assisted in many of these tasks, and in the production of a comprehensive list of our resources. Students from the Faculty of Information Studies at the University of Toronto have completed projects which have contributed greatly to our development.

The federal and provincial governments provided start-up grants and we now have core funding from the province. Our many corporate supporters include CIBC, CIBC Wood-Gundy, Bakeworks, and Telemedia. Willow raises about one-third of its funds through two annual events run by talented and dedicated volunteers.

President's Message


Dear Colleagues,

CMA's WebMed Links

Under the Clinical Resource Section of CMA's home page, WebMed Links is the CMA's "compilation of health- and medicine- related internet sites for the use of physicians in their practice and research". It's a great site for librarians, too! Under the Medical Libraries link is a list of libraries by province, and there are some National and International Medical Libraries listed. There are more than 50 libraries represented, although the list is not exhaustive. This area of the page could provide a good starting point for finding information about a library's resources for ILL purposes or provide quick contact information. The entire CMA site is very well organized, easy to read and navigate, and the list of links to resources in each category is extensive.

New England Journal of Medicine

This site has been recently redesigned into 2 parts: an area for all users and an area for subscribers only. The latter has been enlarged and offers the complete text of the journal, including review articles for all issues since 1993. There is full-text search capacity and a personal archive for saving search results and articles. Each new issue of the journal is now uploaded to the WWW on Wednesdays at 5pm Eastern time. This will give subscribers electronic access to these articles at the same time that the media begins to release stories based on the content of the journal. This site has a professional, comprehensive home page and its information is very clear and concise. Resist taking the "Images Quiz" if you can!

British Medical Journal (eBMJ)

Access to full text of all articles published in the weekly BMJ from January 1997 is FREE until the end of 1998, so take advantage if you can! When the service is no longer free there will be 6 years of BMJ online. Navigation through this site is somewhat awkward and there is a lot of distracting advertising in the form of suggestions of other databases to try. However, the search form allows for a lot of detail and the Browse feature is very useful for quick identification of materials.
