

Spring Banquet Report

AEROSPACE MEDICINE

Major KAREN J. BREECK, BSc, MD

THLA's annual dinner meeting was held at the University of Toronto Faculty Club on May 3rd, 1999. The topic for the evening, Aerospace Medicine, is the study of the healthy human body in abnormal environments. Specifically, it deals with the physiologic problems associated with atmospheric or space flight, e.g., hypoxia, decompression sickness, and the effects of G-force and zero gravity. Major Karen Breeck, our guest speaker, provided a very inspiring presentation, describing her medical career in and out of the military and the role aerospace medicine has played in her life's work.

The new rank of Major is only one of Dr. Breeck's recent accomplishments. She completed her Biology and Medical degrees at the Memorial University of Newfoundland in 1986 and 1990 respectively. This was followed by a rotating internship at York Finch Hospital in Toronto and a year's surgical residency at the National Defence Medical Centre in Ottawa. Dr. Breeck was then posted to an air force base in Greenwood, Nova Scotia, where she completed Flight Surgeon, Tropical Medicine and Basic Diving Medicine courses (1993-1994), topped off with a UN peacekeeping tour in the Golan Heights in Israeli-occupied Syria.

In 1995, Dr. Breeck left the military and went into private practice in northern Ontario. During this time, she developed a keen interest in the Internet and its potential to assist rural physicians. She became the chief medical editor of the website, WebDoctor, which provided her with hands-on experience in the development of quick, value-added access to accurate and relevant medical information via the web. She is currently the Canadian College of Family Physician's Ontario representative for their committee addressing how best to integrate computer health information into the family physician's practice.

Her later return to the military in 1997 saw Dr. Breeck seconded to the Quebec-based Canadian Space Agency to support a 1-year assignment as Assistant Manager/Flight Surgeon for Operational Space Medicine, a program within the Canadian Astronaut Office. The mandate of this position was to assist in planning for medical support of Canadian astronauts on tours of up to six months' duration on the International Space Station.

Dr. Breeck travelled to Houston, Texas to gain familiarization with NASA's medical operations. The highlight of her 3 months at NASA was learning how a shuttle mission crew is medically supported by following the STS-90 Neurolab flight. This mission included Canadian astronaut Dave Williams as one of seven crew members on board, and veteran Canadian astronaut Chris Hadfield, as the mission's Capsule Communicator. During the mission, Dr. Breeck shadowed the lead flight surgeon (personal physician) for Dave Williams. She was also privileged to meet all seven Canadian astronauts, an especially inspiring experience.

Just after finishing the posting with the Space Agency, Hurricane Mitch hit Honduras. The Canadian Force's relief mission to Honduras saw Dr. Breeck whisked off to support the aircrew being sent into the area. After this unexpected detour, she made it to her present posting at the Defence and Civil Institute of Environmental Medicine (DCIEM) located in Downsview, Ontario.

DCIEM is a world-recognized centre of excellence in environmental medicine research. Since its conception over 50 years ago by Frederick Banting (Nobel laureate winner for the invention of insulin), DCIEM has invented things as diverse as the aviator's G-suit, an artificial blood substitute (now undergoing human trials), virtual reality training systems, and diving tables used in today's military, commercial and sport diving communities.

Finally, it appears that Major Breeck's ongoing interest in aerospace medicine has been taken seriously by her superiors; she has been offered the first Aerospace Medicine fellowship in Canada. The fellowship will start this summer and will be hosted out of the University of Toronto. It will include a Master's degree in Health Sciences, and tours of duty in civil, commercial and military aviation venues in Canada and the US.



Web Health Watch

Evidence-Based Medicine (EBM)

The Clinician's Lament: How can I keep up with the Literature?

This simplistic site is a slide show of 63 slides that answer a broad range of questions surrounding the nature of EBM and its practice. The opening page presents the subject of each slide and an individual link to each one so that it is not necessary to go through the entire slide show to get information from the site. Although the information is brief, the slides are excellent for a concise introduction to EBM for librarians, students and practitioners. Toward the end of the slide show are resources for how to keep up with medical literature both practically and psychologically, as well as web resources and general resources for practicing EBM. The thrust of many of these slides could be extrapolated as advice for keeping up with professional literature in any discipline.

Users' Guides to the Medical Literature

This site is a comprehensive, practical resource for the study of EBM. The left-hand frame links to an Overview, Quick Links (providing links to EBM starting points, EBM resources and related resources), searching options, Users' Guides, News (linking to EBM newsgroups and news releases), and files for downloading. The overview is a thorough essay on EBM containing many linked subject headings. The Users' Guides section contains practical information such as how to decide if studies are valid, how to use integrative studies, etc. Although the site is very well organized, some of the linked pages are misleading because the name of the referring link is absent on the page. Nevertheless, this site is an excellent resource for a thorough investigation into the practice and implementation of EBM.

Evidence Based Healthcare: A Resource Pack

This site provides a starting point for practical application on the many facets of EBM. It provides contact information for organizations and academic bodies that promote and practice evidence-based health care. Topic areas such as Critical Appraisal of Evidence, Audit and Managing Change are linked to a brief description of the subject, key references and the names of organizations that practice that area of EBM. The A-Z of Evidence Based Health Care provides more detailed information about organizations referred to in the site. The practical nature of this resource pack makes it useful for administrators or promoters of the practice of EBM; it might be a site to bookmark for reference work.

March Meeting Report

Canadian Health Network

Tuesday, March 30, 1999 CHIS, Toronto Reference Library

Susan Murray introduced the evening's presenters, Miriam Ticoll, Penny Kirby, and Susan Ewing from the Canadian Health Network (CHN). Miriam Ticoll, the resource development team leader, presented background information about the CHN project and previewed the CHN website that is currently under development. The CHN, in partnership with Health Canada, is developing a national Internet-based service to provide information on health promotion and disease prevention, self-care and the performance of the health system to Canadian consumers. The goals of the network are to improve the health of Canadians, enhance existing health information networks, establish a national Internet information base, and collaborate with a broad range of contributors. 26 subjects in health promotion and disease prevention have been chosen as starting points to build the network. The long-range plans are to establish affiliates and regional partners that are experts in these topic areas. These partners will provide information for the CHN database.

The next presenter, Penny Kirby, discussed the collection development policy and the rationale for choosing partnerships. In creating an electronic collection several problems that are unique to the Internet make collection development challenging. The unstable nature of the web, proprietary software, and web pages that use frames require extra ingenuity in order to maintain links to Internet sites. Other factors in collection development include ownership of material, whether the material is timely, is there adequate disclosure, are there any stated caveats about the material and does the site have a usable interface to easily access the material. Partnerships are currently limited to groups that have electronic capability. The groups should preferably be non-profit and have an established reputation for providing current and credible health information.

The final presenter, Susan Ewing, discussed the issues surrounding the challenges in indexing electronic materials. A handout was provided outlining fields in a sample record. The record structure includes a subject area that uses a bilingual controlled vocabulary thesaurus, currently under development at CHN. There are approximately 2,000 records in the current database. The database will be accessible on the Internet by early summer.

Susan Murray thanked the presenters and offered a tour of the Consumer Health Information Service.
