THLA Presentation: "Trust Me, I'm A Librarian!"

Tim Tripp, Virtual Library Project Manager at the University Health Network, spoke to THLA members about the Virtual Library project on April 17, 2000. While the crowd was relatively small (13 people), they were interested and inquisitive! Tim spoke of the brave new world envisioned by UHN senior management who were supportive of the project from the start. He first explained his own "virtual culture shock" moving from Spar Aerospace, where there were only 500 employees, he was the only librarian, the library was low profile, and his work was relatively low risk. In contrast he now had to toil as a high profile project manager in the UHN with 10,000 employees, and where access to information could literally mean life or death.

He described the UHN Virtual Library to date: over 2 dozen databases, 1,500 electronic journals, interactive request forms, library information, internet links, and more. He gave a brief tour of the Virtual Library, and answered numerous questions, including a discussion on negotiating electronic journal contracts with vendors, how electronic forms were sent directly to Information Specialists, etc.

Tim wrapped up by telling the crowd about the developments beyond the Virtual Library – how the Virtual Library will be integrated with the Electronic Patient Record, used as a clinical decision support tool, provide access to clinical practice guidelines, and eventually develop an intelligent agent interface to link the EPR and the VL with Medline.

Tim certainly has his work cut out for himself!

Brian Cameron & Ani Orchanian "Emerging trends in the provision of library services at the University Health Network: an evaluation of the program management model" presented as part of the Federal and Hospital Libraries Sections Symposium entitled Feng-Shui For Surviving the Downsizing Dragon.

Abbreviated Abstract: The purpose of this paper was to describe the evolution of the libraries' Program Management model, and examine the results after one year of implementation. Setting: Libraries of the University Health Network - UHN (Toronto General, Toronto Western, and Princess Margaret Hospitals) in response to the restructuring of the health-care sector in Toronto, and in order to better address the needs of the clinical program areas adopted a program management model for the delivery of library services.

Anita Lambert-Lanning "Integrating Medical Informatics into the Undergraduate Curriculum" Poster #12 coinvestigators: Lynn Watson MD, CCFP; and Mike Evans MD, CCFP. Toronto Western Hospital-UHN Dept. of Family & Community Medicine University of Toronto. 1999-2000. *

Abbreviated Abstract: <u>Background/Population</u>: A web-based workshop to facilitate trainee access to medical informatics and encourage an evidence-based approach to finding information using an 'educational prescription' was implemented in 1997. By the end of the 1998-99 academic year the course was expanded to include trainees from all clinical placement locales in the Family Medicine undergraduate programmes at the University of Toronto. <u>Discussion</u>: Librarian and Physician collaboration on the development and conduct of this web-based workshop may support successful integration of medical informatics and life long learning in this undergraduate curriculum and may have potential applications elsewhere. <u>Conclusion</u>: Results of student evaluations demonstrate the continued popularity of this web-based workshop and web-based resources of learning.


