SEPTEMBER MEETING REPORT

About 30 people attended THLA's September general meeting to hear Liz Avison of the Sci/Med Audiovisual Library speak about the history and current state of audiovisual and multimedia materials at U of T. She described the hardware and software for the 10 multimedia stations now operational. Liz emphasized the need for strong technical support, and advised that when buying hardware and software, get the best you can afford!

Liz demonstrated ADAM (Animated Dissection of Anatomy for Medicine), the most powerful program in the collection. ADAM provides a comprehensive simulation of human anatomy which enables isolation, magnification of three-dimensional views of body structures, and simulation of selected surgical procedures. Attendees were then able to sit at the stations and gain hands-on experience in the use of this software.

One of the questions asked concerned the access of this software on a network. Liz has provided us with an item from the publication EDUPAGE which addresses this issue.

MULTIMEDIA REALITY CHECK ... Image retrieval and document conferencing (whiteboarding) can run over most of today's LAN internetworks with no problems, but glitzier applications such as networked video are "far from ready for corporate networks", according to research by *Data Communications* magazine. Hearty bandwidth appetites and a myriad of problems caused by video and sound boards make video "the bleeding edge" of multimedia applications. (*Data Communications* 9/21/94, page 44.)

UPSTATE NEW YORK & ONTARIO CHAPTER OF THE MEDICAL LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

1994 MEETING REPORT

The UNYOC Annual Meeting, held in Syracuse, New York from October 2nd to 5th, had as its theme *Health Information 2000: Share the Vision*. The meeting was full of interesting programme sessions, CE opportunities, a poster session, exhibits, the business meeting, MLA updates, and social activities. One of the most interesting events was the keynote address.

The keynote address was delivered by Valerie Florance, Director of the Edward G. Miner Library at the University of Rochester School of Medicine. Her topic was "The Art and Science of Information Work".

Ms. Florance defined "information work" as the design of products and services to meet information needs. She distinguished between "art" and "science", mentioning that art translates a need and science applies systematic evaluation and aims to explain. She emphasized the "design" component, saying that it was a synthesis of art and science, and that it involved devising artifacts to attain goals.

In her talk, Ms. Florance included a discussion of research she has just completed for a doctoral thesis. She used "design" to create an online bibliographic record tailored to physician use (using the *Medline* record as a starting point). She calls this record a clinical extract. One of her goals is to develop a mechanism to enable physicians to select articles easily and to reduce the time required to do this. She is looking at mechanisms used to compute sensitivity and specificity in the context of medical database searching. She mentioned that the "art" involved working with physicians to help them make better decisions; the "science" involved consistency in the interview stages of her research.

Ms. Florance had many interesting slides to illustrate her concepts. She started with a grid comparing the traditional library, electronic library, and knowledge centre against eight criteria (role, mission, centre of action, central activity, core expert, core asset, funding source, and primary client interaction). She ended with a grid showing activities organized on an academic model of service, education, and research against criteria of products, services, and funding models. She stressed the importance of partnerships within and beyond the organization.

THLA / CONSORTIUM UNION LIST NEWS

The THLA / Consortium Union List Advisory Subcommittee met on Tuesday, November 1. Attending were: Dorothy Davey of Medical Information Services, Linda Devore of Mount Sinai Hospital, Joan Leishman of the Consortium, Cathy Lindsey-King of BOVAR-CONCORD Environmental, and Elizabeth Reid of The Toronto Hospital - TWD. This meeting was convened to discuss the next edition of the *Union List*, and to exchange information and ideas about DOCLINE and the impact its existence may have on THLA member libraries and the *Union List*. The 11th Edition of the THLA/Consortium Union List will be published in March of 1995, and will contain periodical listings for 64 contributing libraries. More than 7000 periodical titles are now reported in the Union List - this includes a portion of the former Academy of Medicine collection, which is now housed at Toronto General Hospital.

As always, participating libraries are encouraged to submit their holdings updates to the Consortium Office on a continuous basis, but contributors are reminded that a notice outlining the production schedule and contribution deadline for the next edition will be mailed out to them in December.

The purchase prices of the 11th edition have been set as follows: \$55.00 for contributing libraries, \$65.00 for other THLA members, and \$85.00 for non-members of THLA. An order form for the new edition will be included in a future issue of the *THLA NEWS*.

FYI: A SURVEY OF THE THLA MEMBERSHIP BETWEEN 1988 & 1993

In the last issue of the NEWS, we presented Part I of this survey of the THLA membership lists for the 1988/1989 and 1993/1994 years. Having examined the demographics for our members and their affiliations, let us now turn to a study of the population distribution of the institution types themselves.

Several observations can be made by comparing these numbers with those of the membership:

- THLA gained 18 new members (a 12.5% increase) over this five year period, but the number of institutions represented only changed by 6 (a 6.7% increase). This accompanied the increase in the number of nonaffiliated members.
- The percentage drop for members in the educational sector was 8.9%, but the decrease in the percentage of educational institutions was only 2.2%.
- The percentage of the membership affiliated with associations fell by 2.0%, but the percentage of these
 institutions showed a decrease of 3.7%. Government membership decreased by 0.6%, but the percentage of
 institutions represented decreased by 1.6%. Membership numbers for the pharmaceuticals industry jumped by
 about 2%, but five years later, the increase in the number of institutions for this industry had risen by 3.5%.
- It is very interesting to note that the other health care category showed a 0.3% increase in membership, but a 1.7% decrease in the number of institutions.
- Contrary to the incorrect report in the last issue of the NEWS, the number and percentage of hospitals
 represented in the institution population did not decrease an increase was shown, as was the case for the
 membership numbers. It is interesting to note however that the percentage population of the membership
 increased by 4.3%, while the institution population increased by only 2.9%.
- As was the case for the membership numbers, the number of institutions representing consultants and vendors remained relatively constant. The law firm membership numbers and the number of institutions showed the same increase.

DOCLINE: SOME QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

What is DOCLINE and what does it do?

DOCLINE is the automated, menu-driven interlibrary loan request and referral system of the U.S. National Library of Medicine. It routes requests automatically to libraries until the request is filled, allows users to send, receive and update requests, and issues reports on all ILL activity.

Can Canadians use it?

Canadian health sciences libraries willing to contribute their holdings to the SERHOLD database may participate. Users of GRATEFUL MED can send orders to DOCLINE libraries by using LOANSOME DOC.

Is DOCLINE expensive?

There is a registration fee of \$75, an annual fee of \$25, and some SERHOLD costs. Actual use is free for now.

How can I join?

Canadians can register through CISTI. CHLA and CISTI have prepared an information package, available on request. It includes how to join, options for submitting holdings, costs, and contact names. CISTI has announced that it will begin to publish a DOCLINE newsletter beginning in February 1995. In addition, there will be an extensive article in the January 1995 issue of *BMC*.
