INFORMATION CENTRE PROFILE: CCNM

CCNM - The Canadian College of Naturopathic Medicine is one of four recognized naturopathic institutions in North America and the only one of its kind in Canada. Each student, prior to admission to CCNM, must have three years of pre-medical studies from an accredited university program. The College provides four years of training in basic medical sciences, diagnosis, naturopathic principles and therapeutics, including extensive, supervised clinical experience in the Naturopathic College Clinic (which is also on the premises). Graduates take international licensing examinations before registration is granted to practise as a Doctor of Naturopathic Medicine.

Conventional and naturopathic medicine complement one another, but they differ in their approaches to treatment. Naturopathic medicine assesses the whole person, and focuses on disease prevention and health enhancement using natural therapies and patient education. The role of the naturopathic doctor is to teach patients how to better care for their own health.

LEARNING AND INFORMATION RESOURCES CENTRE

The mandate of the Resource Centre is to: a) support the College's curriculum; b) serve the research and information needs of the

naturopathic community; and c) respond to inquiries regarding naturopathy/complementary medicine from patients, institutions and the public at large. Materials include books, periodicals, audio and video tapes, slides and learning packages in various formats. The library also subscribes to CD-ROM databases such as MEDLINE, CMI (Complementary Medicine Index). RADAR (Homeopathic Database), ACCUVISION (Traditional Chinese Medicine Database), IBIS (Interactive BodyMind Information Systems) among others. Using the Internet, which is available by appointment, students are able to gain access to the growing amount of alternative health care resources in various external databases.

A historical book collection from the estate of Dr. Irma Kennedy-Jackson, one of the first women to graduates in medicine from the University of Toronto, is also housed in the Resource Centre. Her collection of homeopathic medicine and homeopathic psychiatry constitutes an irreplaceable treasure for medical historians.

IMPACT OF LIBRARY INFORMATION SERVICES

This report was produced by the Ottawa-Carleton Hospital Libraries. If you would like a complete copy of this report including references, please contact Colleen Mulloy, THLA President.

PURPOSE

Our aim is to highlight the services provided by the hospital libraries in Ottawa-Carleton, to outline some of the ways we cooperate, to explain how we contribute to the care of patients, the support of hospital staff, the conduct of health care research, and the teaching of health care students.

LIBRARY AND INFORMATION SERVICES

The primary role of Library and Information Services is to support patient care, research, and the maintenance of clinical competence among professional staffs. Libraries provide knowledge-based material which has been quality filtered and peer reviewed. Knowledge-based information differs from the data from financial and clinical systems, which, with office automation and hospital-wide networks, are provided by Information Services departments.

IMPACT OF LIBRARY AND INFORMATION SERVICES

Clinical staff use information to treat patients, conduct health care research, and maintain clinical competence. A number of studies have evaluated the impact of the hospital library on patient care.

- In major studies conducted by King and Haynes, physicians reported that the information provided by the hospital library positively affected patient care. It changed the way cases were handled, contributed to better informed clinical decisions, and resulted in higher quality patient care.
- A study at the Ottawa General Hospital Library on the impact of literature searching on patient care found that 52% of physicians said that searches reduced medical costs. 68% of physicians said that searches helped them select the most appropriate therapy or expanded their current knowledge on a subject. All physicians surveyed felt that the literature searches had an impact on their clinical practice.
- In the Rochester study, Marshall measured the impact of physicians' use of the hospital library on clinical decision making. 80% of respondents handled some aspect of patient care differently after receiving information from the library. Physicians rated the information provided by the library more highly than that received from other information sources, including diagnostic imaging, laboratory tests and discussions with colleagues.

 Klein's study demonstrated that information for patient care retrieved by librarians in a timely manner affect costs. It resulted in lower costs and shorter lengths of stay in hospital.

Libraries provide collections in print or electronic form, including books, journals, audiovisuals, CD-ROM, databases and the Internet. Library staff supplement materials from their own collections by the sharing of resources with other libraries...

- As health care administration becomes increasingly dependent on timely information, library and information services become more important. Libraries and librarians provide valuable resources and expertise in the planning and development of hospital projects, especially those with an information management component. While library budgets represent a small portion of hospital budgets, they provide a huge dividend in cost-saving by efficient provision of information...
- In response to trends towards greater patient, family and community involvement in health care, hospital libraries offer consumer health information to patients and their families in the Ottawa-Carleton region.

The teaching philosophy of evidence-based medicine that is supported by the University of Ottawa and its teaching hospitals is based on the use of quality health care literature to answer clinical questions. Libraries are an integral part of that philosophy...

CONCLUSION

Throughout Ottawa-Carleton, health sciences libraries have a history of cooperating to ensure good service and to prudently manage resources. Nevertheless, it is one area where re-engineering has become routine, has a history of success, and where real reforms and improvements in service have been made.

It is important to acknowledge this effort in ongoing restructuring plans. There is every evidence that in the 'information age', timely information is rapidly growing in importance in health care. Good information is vital to the effective management of health care services, the economical management of facilities and the maintenance and improvement of health care standards, and must be an important factor in all restructuring considerations.
