Medical and Health Applications for PDAs

Personal digital assistants (PDAs), also known as handheld computers, have made information management and data transfer more convenient than could have been imagined just a few years ago. A number of professionals in health care, as in other fields, are taking advantage of freeware, shareware and commercial applications for handhelds. Health sciences librarians may not currently need to use these applications themselves, but given their popularity among health care professionals and students, and the growing role of the librarian in clinical and decision support teams, it is wise to become familiar with handhelds and their use in medicine. This article provides a selective survey of popular PDA software for medical reference, diagnostic calculation and patient management.

Clinical reference texts are a natural choice for conversion to handheld format. Handheldmed (www.handheldmed.com) sells a number of standard works, such as the Merck Manual, Griffith's 5-Minute Clinical Consult, Harrison's Principles of Internal Medicine and Taber's Cyclopedic Medical Dictionary. Particularly commendable is Handheldmed's effort to provide up-to-date editions and to support both Palm OS and Windows CE (the operating system for the Pocket PC). For drug reference, the most popular tool is ePocrates (www.epocrates.com), a free Palm-only database with the added ability to annotate drug entries (registration required). Regular updates are available. Skyscape's A2zDrugs (www.skyscape.com/products/a2zdrugs.htm), a commercial program with a free demo, provides a good deal of information that ePocreates lacks, such as mechanisms of action; it's available for both Palm OS and Windows CE.

Diagnostic calculators are available for a variety of general and specialty-specific needs. MedMath (www.stanford.edu/~pmcheng/medmath), a free program for the Palm, calculates 28 commonly-used equations, such as Body Mass Index and Number Needed to Treat. Thenar's PregCalc (www.thenar.com/pregcalc) is a commercial Palm-based ob/gyn application available in professional, patient and site-licensed versions; it is to be hoped that other medical handheld applications will follow suit. Of particular use for evidence-based research is EBM Calculator (www.cebm.utoronto.ca/medicine/ebm/palm/ebmcalc), a freeware Palm program from the Centre for Evidence-Based Medicine at Mount Sinai Hospital-University Health Network. This tool calculates statistics for RCTs, as well as diagnostic, prospective and case-control studies.

Patient management applications are another popular form of PDA software. The commercial ePhysician Practice suite for the Palm (www.ephysician.com) allows physicians to schedule appointments online, send prescriptions to pharmacies, and track billing information. PdaMD's Patient Keeper (www.pdamed.com), another commercial program for Palm OS, allows physicians to prioritize and classify patient problems, track patients' medication courses, and create to-do lists for patient-related tasks. Despite the potential usefulness of patient management tools for PDAs, there are still privacy and security issues that need to be ironed out before health care professionals will be able to use them comfortably.

The brief summary above is just the tip of the iceberg for medical handheld applications. Leading journals and medical news services have just begun to produce content for PDAs; can virtual clinical boards and conferences be far behind?

Look for a more in-depth article on this subject by Jessie McGowan and myself in a forthcoming issue of Bibliotheca Medica Canadiana.

NUTRITION AND THE AGING PROCESS; ANTI AGING AGENTS

Date: Thursday, Oct. 18, 2001

Time: 6pm – 8-pm

Speaker: Dr. James Patrick Meschino

In this seminar Dr. Meschino will reveal the leading edge breakthroughs in nutrition and lifestyle medicine that are associated with longevity, anti-aging, stress management and reducing our risk of cancer, heart disease, osteoporosis and other common degenerative conditions and the rate at which we age is approximately 75% attributable to our lifestyle and nutrition patterns and only 25% attributable to our genetic make up. Dr. Meschino will provide the evidence to substantiate these facts and explain prudent and practical strategies we can use to help minimize the risk of degenerative conditions and slow the biological processes of aging within our cells and tissues.

Dr. James Meschino holds a Master's degree in Sciences with specialties in Nutrition and Biology. He is on the board of advisors of the Academy of Anti-Aging Research and is the Clinical and Research Director for the Renai Sante Institute of Integrative Medicine. He is an Assistant Professor in the Division of Graduate Studies and Research at CMCC and a postgraduate faculty member of the American Council on Exercise (ACE). He is in active practice at Ryerson University in Toronto.

CHLA/ABSC News

The CHLA/ABSC Focus Group for Toronto, held on September 24, 2001 at Robart's Library, was a success. Participants from a variety of health library settings identified major issues in their libraries and offered suggestions as to how CHLA/ABSC could help local libraries and professionals in this regard. As well, the CHLA/ABSC board representatives spoke about the organization's current initiatives. Watch this space for a full report in the next issue.

The need for standards and professional (i.e. librarian) assistance in health literature searching has come to the fore, after an insufficient literature search contributed to the recent death of a healthy Johns Hopkins study participant. On September 25, 2001, Jessie McGowan, on behalf of CHLA/ABSC, issued a press release and a letter to CMAJ, stressing the need for clinical investigators to collaborate with librarians and announcing that CHLA/ABSC will work with organizations such as the Medical Library Association to develop practice guidelines for literature searching.


