
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

MARCH 20 MEETING, BOYS AND GIRLS HOUSE, 40 St. George St., Toronto

Boys and Girls House was the perfect setting for the March 20 Meeting, being the headquarters of Camilla Gryski, the evening's speaker. For those THLA Members who were interested there was time enough to browse the excellent children's collection.

Camilla gave a succinct overview of the history of patient library services at The Hospital for Sick Children, punctuating her comments with lively anecdotes from past annual reports and her own experiences. She described in detail the physical and ethical obstacles that are inherent in the task of providing service to a vast and fluctuating patient body whose ages range from infant to young adults. She used a variety of puppets and her ever-at-hand loop of string to demonstrate the techniques which enable her to break through the defences of so many insecure and understandably reticent patient library users. Her enthusiasm was infectious and by the end of the evening she had managed to teach even the most uncoordinated (i.e. me!) of her audience to make a simple string broom or palm tree, depending upon which way the string was held.

Camilla also described very briefly some of the work that went into producing <u>Cats Cradle</u>.

A sequel is now planned and will undoubtedly meet with the success of the first book which sold some 5,000 copies in the six-week period preceding Christmas 1983 - definitely a Canadian bestseller. Those of us who enjoyed enormously her presentation cannot help but wish her well in her second publishing project.

Undoubtedly Camilla, as much as anyone present, was in need of coffee by the end of her talk and thanks to Nancy Young we were able to oblige. (The evening had got off to a bad start with the discovery that there wasn't an urn on the premises, but Nancy and U. of T. came to the rescue). Many thanks also to Elizabeth Uleryk who had baked batches upon batches of marvellous cookies.

MAY 7, 1984 ANNUAL DINNER MEETING, SUTTON PLACE HOTEL

THLA's 1983-84 year culminated in the Dinner Meeting that was held at the Sutton Place Hotel. My thanks, on behalf of all who attended, will be sent to the Catering Manager, Mr. Max Willi, for exceptionally good food and polite, efficient service.

We were privileged to have as our guest Mary Brown, Director of the Theatres Branch of the Ministry of Consumer and Commercial Relations and Chairman of the Ontario Board of Censors.

After giving a brief history of the Board of Censors, Mrs. Brown laid out in succinct terms the Board's current mandate and emphasized that its members are very

largely devoted to the task of classifying, not censoring, films for <u>PUBLIC</u> screening. Regarding the censorchip aspect of her job, Mrs. Brown wished it to be known that the Board is constantly engaged in reassessing standards of tolerance within the Ontario community and each of the Board members spends many hours annually in contact with the public.

In her capacity as Chairman of the Board, Mrs. Brown has on a number of occasions met with the international community on matters pertaining to film censorship.

Before concluding her powerful address Mrs. Brown cited what she termed her litany: a brief description of scenes from films which she has personally reviewed and which illustrate all too graphically the degradation of human beings.

Given an audience largely comprising librarians, Mrs. Brown was unquestionably not preaching to the converted; librarians are well known for their stance against censorship and, in all likelihood, many misgivings lingered after the meeting. Nonetheless Mrs. Brown gave us all much food for thought during her eloquent and compelling address and during the question and answer period that followed the subject of the NFB's film on pornography, Not a Love Story, was mentioned. It was suggested that the film, which is available for screening to groups, might be shown at a future THLA meeting. The film, as most of you will know, is extremely explicit and may be offensive to some members. For that reason the Executive would welcome your comments on the subject; an alternative to screening the film at a regularly scheduled meeting of the 1984-85 year might be to arrange a separate viewing evening. Please contact Bev Brown, your incoming President-Elect, or me to express your views.

For those of you who were not present on Monday evening I would like again to say what a pleasure it has been to serve as President-Elect. Throughout 1983-84 I have obviously had an enormous amount of help from other members of the Executive, and the support of many of the members at large; for all of this I have been extremely grateful and look forward to working with you during 1984-85.

THLA CONSTITUTION AMENDMENTS

As a result of the change in the membership year that was unanimously approved at the meeting of March 20, the THLA constitution has been amended as follows:

Page 2, Article IV, Section 2, under the heading "Fees", Amended to read:

Payments of the prescribed membership fees shall be deemed to cover membership in the Association for one membership year. The membership year shall run from July 1 to June 30.

1, under the heading "Fiscal

Amended to read:

The fiscal year of the Association shall end on the thirtieth day of June.

Members are asked to make the appropriate changes to their personal copies of the constitution.

The Toronto Health Libraries Association: Union List of Periodicals, 4th edition, 1984, 433 pages, is now available for purchase! Please use the enclosed form (don't forget to include your name and library) to order your copy(ies); we would appreciate prompt payment, as Dr. Fillery has a hefty printing bill from the U of T Press. Since the cost of first-class mail is approximately \$2.50, please try to make arrangements to pick up your union list at the Faculty of Dentistry Library unless you are on HPI.

This computer-produced list has been a learning experience for both Dr. Fillery and myself. There are a number of "bugs" in this edition that should be eliminated in the next (this, I promise you, won't take two years to produce - we're aiming at annual revisions). It would have taken another couple of months to edit the final

copy and I didn't think that anyone wanted to wait that additional
amount of time. I encourage all of
you to let me know (preferably in
writing) what you don't like about
the Union List, what you do like,
and any constructive suggestions
on how to improve the next one.

When using the 4th edition, please note that:

- a) the numbers preceding the periodical titles do <u>not</u> reflect the exact number of titles in the union list: this is intended to be an index for the computer to make additions and deletions (older titles were retained in the database from the 3rd edition in case future cooperating libraries owned them).
- b) an entry runs from number to number, and occasionally, a holding will appear beneath a "to" or "from" entry

e.g. CALCIFIED TISSUE INTERNATION-AL, 27(1969)

> MSH: 35- SMH: 35- TWH: 27-FROM CALCIFIED TISSUE RE-SEARCH

UTD: 27-

Dentistry <u>also</u> owns this title.

- c) when "the" falls anywhere other than the initial word of a title, it is used in filing, N.B. this is different than in the 3rd edition e.g. JOURNAL OF THANATOLOGY JOURNAL OF THE ACADEMY OF GENERAL DENTISTRY JOURNAL OF THE ACADEMY OF REHABILITATIVE AUDIOLOGY
- d) when there was a change of title,

libraries did not always split their holdings, so it is necessary to check "to" and "from" entries to be sure that you are aware of all the libraries that own the title - the AMA ARCHIVES...titles are particularly a problem in this regard.

e) in very rare instances, an entry will have no holdings: this is because a library either owns the "to" or "from" title <u>OR</u> because they did not correctly split their holdings and they in fact own the title

e.g. AMA ARCHIVES OF NEUROLOGY, 1(1959)-2(1960) FROM ARCHIVES OF NEUROLOGY

Several libraries listed under ARCHIVES OF NEUROLOGY actually do own AMA ARCHIVES OF NEURO-LOGY but they did not split their holdings properly.
